

What Can a Sociology Major Do?

A major in sociology prepares you for the challenges of the 21st century. Critical thinking, research and data analysis, communication skills, and intercultural and global perspectives are in demand in the workplace as well as in the world at large. Sociology equips you with the sophisticated understanding of complex issues necessary in an increasingly diverse and interconnected global society. Sociology prepares you to understand how individuals' biographies or their personal troubles are connected to and shaped by history and public issues.

Our courses are organized around the themes of law, justice, and society; power, inequality, and social change; sexuality, health, and the life course; culture, identity, and the media; and organizations, work, and the economy. Service-Learning & Study Abroad

You have the opportunity to deepen your understanding of social problems and issues through experiential learning. Individually designed <u>ser-</u><u>vice-learning courses</u> give you the opportunity to study an area of interest at a related professional worksite.

We encourage our majors to take advantage of Mizzou's <u>study-abroad opportunities</u> to broaden their education in an international setting.

<u>Mizzou Alternative Breaks</u> are another option for travel in the U.S., and they offer you the chance to serve a community in need. Past participants have made a difference doing work in animal shelters, camps, disaster recovery situations, abuse shelters, and many other areas.

Research & Internships

You also have the opportunity to work one on one with faculty on research projects. You can learn by assisting faculty on their research, or undertake your own projects through the departmental honors thesis, the College of Arts and Science <u>Undergraduate</u> <u>Research Mentorship Program</u>, or other university programs supporting undergraduate research.

Advanced undergraduates are encouraged to undertake professional internships with local non-profits, government, or businesses. Students have recently interned at Columbia Public Schools, Artists First, DeafLEAD, and the Missouri Crisis Line.

Department Community

The department regularly schedules Sociology Conversations, an informal gathering of faculty and students (with pizza!) to discuss important social issues of the day. Recent conversations have included the student protests of fall 2015, issues of higher education in the 21st century, and the so-called alt-right demonstration in Charlottesville, Virginia, in 2017. Sociology majors are also eligible for membership in the international sociology honor society, Alpha Kappa Delta.
