


Religious Studies



What is Religious Studies?

The academic study of religion focuses on forms of religious life and religious expression, even as it asks what religion is. It investigates basic issues about human experience, surveying and analyzing how people have understood, shaped, and expressed what it means to be human. Religious studies challenges your ability to understand and interpret texts and practices from a variety of cultural sources and historical settings.

Religious ideas and institutions are in close relationship with those of law, politics, economics, art, and science, among others. As our society becomes more global, the need to make connections with one another be-

comes all the more critical. Religious studies can help you become a more critical thinker and expand your cultural competence. Learning how to analyze disparate ideas, texts, historical contexts, and institutions, and place them in conversation with each other is the key skill set for the new millennium.
